Entry Requirements	<p>Normally, at least a 2.1 honours classification in a degree taken in an appropriate subject at a British or Irish university, or an equivalent qualification on the completion of appropriate tertiary-level studies elsewhere.</p> <p>Applicants whose native language is not English will be required to give proof of their proficiency in the same language. Normally, this proof will take the form of an IELTS score of at least 7.0.</p>
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Programme Regulations	<p><b>Please refer to the General Regulations for Postgraduate Taught Programmes.</b></p> <p><b>Attendance requirements</b> In order to qualify for the award of the degree, students must normally have attended all contact hours scheduled in their timetable and as scheduled with their supervisor in respect of tutorials for their dissertation. Full-time students are normally required to attend the University for two teaching periods over one academic year. Part-time students are normally required to attend the University for specified periods over two academic years.</p> <p><b>Criteria for Progression to Dissertation</b> Part time students cannot start the Dissertation until they have completed the 40 credit Research methods module.</p> <p><b>Dissertation/Project Requirements</b> The dissertation is 15,000 words long and represents 60 credits. It will be researched, written and completed within a seven-month period running from mid-February to mid-September.</p>
