Educational Aims of the Programme	<p>The programme aims to inculcate a range of knowledge and equip students with the skills required for the understanding and application of law and legal knowledge in respect of the English legal system. In particular, the programme aims to:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• Meet the statutory accreditation requirements for legal practice in England and Wales (the “Academic Stage”) through providing a thorough introduction to the foundations of legal knowledge as prescribed by the professional bodies, as well as providing students with the opportunity to study further subjects within the field of commercial law broadly defined.</li><li>• Develop students’ awareness of the economic and business environment in which organisations operate, as well as their understanding of the manner in which economic activities are structured and measured.</li><li>• Develop students’ ability to work independently, critically and reflectively.</li><li>• Provide students with key analytical and other academic but transferable skills for lifelong learning.</li><li>• Ensure relevance by maintaining and enhancing relevant legal, professional and business links, including the development of students’ knowledge of ethical principles and values.</li><li>• Maintain and enhance the employability of graduates.</li></ul>

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Programme Regulations	
1. Specific Assessment Requirements for Modules (If any, e.g. Modules which may not be condoned)	<p>The following modules on the LLB Law with Management constitute the Foundations of Legal Knowledge: Contract Law, Constitutional Law, Criminal Law, Law of Torts, EU Law, Equity and Trusts, Land Law.</p> <p><i>Pass mark</i></p> <p>The BSB and SRA require that <b>all modules constituting the Foundations of Legal Knowledge are passed with a mark of at least 40%</b>. This is an <i>overall</i> pass mark: where a module constituting the Foundations of Legal Knowledge contains more than one assessment, it is the <i>overall</i> mark which must be at least 40%.</p> <p><i>Marginal failure</i></p> <p>Where a student has marginally failed one (and only one) of the Foundations of Legal Knowledge modules, the student's performance in that module may be condoned. This is not the University's discretion and can only be done with permission from the professional bodies. A student is regarded as having marginally failed a module where their mark is within 5% of the QLD pass mark, i.e., 35% or above.</p> <p>Modules are unlikely to be condoned where the student has been condoned in <u>any</u> other modules on the LLB Law with Management.</p>
2. Assessment	There is no Ordinary Degree available for students on this programme.
3. Attendance	Attendance at all teaching sessions (including lectures, tutorials and workshops) is compulsory. The failure to attend teaching sessions without good reason may result in a student's withdrawal from the programme. Students should inform their Academic Tutor, or the LLB Course Director, of any circumstances affecting their ability to attend teaching sessions.

4. Professional Body Requirements	<p><b>4.1 Qualifying law degree (QLD) status: minimum degree requirements for entry to the legal profession</b></p> <p>The LLB Law with Management is a qualifying law degree (QLD). It therefore satisfies the Academic Stage of training for those wishing to become a solicitor or barrister in England and Wales. On completion of the LLB Law with Management students can, subject to certain conditions set down by the SRA and BSB, proceed to the Vocational Stage of training. If a student fails to comply with the requirements of the professional bodies they will not graduate with a degree that will be recognised as enabling them to proceed to the Vocational Stage of training.</p> <p>The SRA sets no minimum degree classification requirement for students wishing to become solicitors. <u>However</u>, students wishing to become barristers must obtain at least a lower second class honours degree (a 2.2). The Director of the BSB has the discretion to permit a student to proceed to the Vocational Stage of training for the Bar where a 2.2 degree has not been awarded. This will, however, be exercised “rarely and where there are exceptional circumstances” (<i>Academic Stage Book</i>, para. 2.5).</p> <p><b>4.2 Time limits for completing the LLB Law with Management</b></p> <p>In order for the LLB Law with Management to be regarded as a QLD, it must be completed in no more than six years.</p>
5. Prizes	<p>5.1 The award of available Prizes is at the discretion of the Examination Board.</p> <p>5.2 The Board of Examiners will not award a prize to any student who has failed the module in question or who is unsuccessful in progressing to the next stage of the degree.</p>
